Purpose of a Results Section

- Provides an overview of the relevant findings of your study.
- Significant findings provide evidence for your original research questions or hypotheses.
 - Think about how your data aligns with or deviates from your research questions or hypotheses.

Subsections

- Only include subsections that are relevant to your report.
- Descriptive Statistics
 - Summary of key variables
- Inferential Statistics
 - Significant findings from the statistical analyses that were conducted
 - Presentation of results (including tables and figures)
- Overall summary of key findings
 - Only use the ones that make sense for your report.

Subsections: Descriptive Statistics

- Description of participants
 - Provide demographic information about the participants (e.g., age, gender, ethnicity) and any relevant characteristics.
 - Do not repeat information found in the method section.
- Summary of key variables
 - Present descriptive statistics in graphs and tables (e.g., means, standard deviations) for each key variable in your study.
- Example Write-Up:
 - “Participants (N = 100) were undergraduate students from a university. The mean age was 20.5 years (SD = 1.8). Participants reported studying an average of 15.3 hours per week (SD = 3.2).”

Subsections: Inferential Statistics

- Statistical analyses
 - Describe the statistical tests used to analyze your data (e.g., t-tests, ANOVA, correlations, regression).
- Presentation of results
 - Report the outcomes of statistical tests, including test statistics, degrees of freedom, significance levels (p-values), and effect sizes if applicable.
 - Use tables and graphs to display these findings.
- Example Write-up:
 - “A Pearson correlation analysis was conducted to examine the relationship between hours of sleep per night and GPA. There was a statistically significant negative correlation between hours of sleep per night and GPA, $r = -0.30$, $p < .01$. The correlation coefficient (r) indicated a moderate negative relationship between hours of sleep and GPA. The p-value of less than .01 suggests that the correlation is unlikely to be due to random chance.”
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Tips

- Use tables and figures appropriately,
 - Use tables and/or figures to present complex data or detailed results.
 - Ensure tables and figures are labeled clearly and referenced in the text.
- Provide interpretation, but avoid discussion.
 - Focus on describing your findings rather than interpreting them in-depth.
 - Save interpretation and discussion of the results for the Discussion section of your paper.
- Be objective.
 - Present your results objectively, without language that denotes personal bias or interpretation.
 - Do not say that a “the hypothesis was confirmed.” Instead, say “there was a significant difference...”



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
