## Response Paper 2

#### Overview

In this assignment, you will consider the concepts of gender and gender role stereotypes and reflect on how gender role stereotypes affect you. You will write a short paper and upload your paper as a word-processed document to the Response Paper 2 drop-box in the online classroom. Your paper should be written in your own words using proper punctuation and grammar. This assignment is worth up to 50 points. Your grade is based on how well you respond to the assignment topic and how well you follow the required format for the paper.

#### **Background for the Assignment**

The concept of gender refers to how an individual see himself or herself as male or female. Gender develops through the interaction of biological, cognitive, and socioemotional factors. Gender is more than a person's biological sex. It includes biological sex and the individual's understanding of what it means to be male or female.

Gender roles are the expectations about how males and females think, feel, and behave. We learn these roles from birth. Gender role stereotypes are beliefs about psychological and behavioral characteristics of males and females that do not take into account the differences among individuals. For example, a common gender stereotype in the U.S.is that males are better at math than females. This stereotype does not take into account that some women are exceptional mathematicians who have contributed to the development of cutting-edge technologies and some men have trouble with algebra.

Gender role stereotypes are very pervasive in our culture, as well as other cultures. Williams, Satterwhite, and Best (1999) conducted a study of gender stereotypes across 25 cultures. They found the characteristics associated with male stereotypes were more active and stronger than those characteristics associated with female stereotypes. Table 1 below lists some characteristics commonly associated with the male gender and the female gender based on their research.

# The Assignment

In this paper, you will write about the stereotypes associated with maleness and femaleness and how they have affected you. Use the questions below to help you think about the topic and answer those that relate to your own experience with gender stereotypes. You do not need to answer all of the questions. You can write a successful paper by addressing any one of these questions.

- To what degree do you feel you identify with characteristics associated with your own gender?
- To what degree do you feel you identify with characteristics associated with the opposite gender?
- How have you felt as though society or specific people have pressured you to "be" a characteristic that you were not, just because you were male or female?
- How have you stereotyped someone based on gender, thinking that they should "be" a certain way?
- How have gender roles changed over the last 50 years? How have they NOT changed since hunter-gatherer days?
- Are gender roles helpful in some way or do they only perpetuate stereotypes?

Remember, this paper is about your own experience. Please do not use quotes. It should not be necessary to include any outside references in your work on this paper.

- Word-processed document. Microsoft Word documents, PDF documents, or other formats readable by Microsoft Word are acceptable formats.
- 250-300 words
- Double-spaced with margins of at least .75 inches and not longer than one page.
- 12-point Times New Roman font
- Heading Format use this format for the heading of your paper

# **Grading Criteria**
