## Project 3 Textual Evaluation Checklist

- MLA Formatting
  - First page formatting (MLA top left should have name, instructor, course, date),
  - o Margins (one inch),
  - Pagination (insert page number top right and type Last name then space before #, e.g. Smith 1)
  - Spacing (double)
  - Black Font (Times New Roman 12 ONLY),
  - Title (centered, not bold or underlined, no extra line after it)
    - Title should be specific to your paper's topic. No titles should be something simple like "Position Paper" or "Analytic Exploration"
  - In-text citations (formatted correctly at the END of the sentences for all quoted or paraphrased source material)
    - Use page numbers if there are obvious page numbers in the document
      - E.g. (Swales 2)
    - Use paragraph numbers if there are no obvious page numbers
      - E.g. (Swales par. 23)
    - The period goes outside of the closing parenthesis
    - Watch the MLA videos in Course Kaltura for additional examples
  - Paragraph indentions (standard tab)
  - Works Cited (title, separate page, alphabetical order)
    - Watch the video on Course Kaltura for an example
    - To indent the second line of a citation, press ENTER then DELETE then TAB
- Basic Requirements
  - o 750-1,250 words. No more and no less.
  - Five (5) sources
    - Must be cited in your Works Cited page AND in-text citations
    - You cannot put something in your Works Cited page and not cite it as an in-text citation. You must do both.
- Content Checklist
  - Introductory Paragraph
    - State your position and provide context
      - You may choose the same position as your presentation or switch to the otherside.
    - Thesis Statement (the last sentence of your introductory paragraph) should answer this question:
      - Should Florida decrease funding for the University of South Florida?

- Misc. Requirements for Good Writing
  - Introductory Paragraph
    - See requirements above
  - Transitions between paragraphs. Use this list of transition works to help you:
    - <a href="https://www.smart-words.org/linking-words/transition-words.html">https://www.smart-words.org/linking-words/transition-words.html</a>
  - o Topic Sentences:
    - Every topic sentence should be about your position, or refutation
  - Body Paragraph Content
    - Each paragraph should be providing an expanded answer to the question:
      - Should Florida decrease funding for the University of South Florida?
  - Conclusion
    - This should not be repetitive. Provide a detailed answer to the main question (Should Florida decrease funding for the University of South Florida?) that is informed by the evidence you discussed in your body paragraphs.
