Objective

What is **customary law**, and who defines it? Colonial legal systems often restructured or invented traditions to serve the interests of the state. This assignment invites you to examine how **colonial legal frameworks shaped what we call "customary law"** and how **these historical structures continue to impact indigenous legal struggles today**—especially in the case of **Marco Temporal in Brazil**. Through **Yadudu's analysis of colonialism's impact on Islamic law in Nigeria**, **Comaroff's discussion of law as a colonial weapon**, and the **ongoing legal battles over indigenous land in Brazil**, you will explore how law is **not only historical but also deeply political in shaping access to justice**.

Prompt

This assignment has **two parts**:

- 1. Developing a Critical Question
 - As you read Yadudu's analysis of Islamic Law and Comaroff's discussion on colonialism and customary law, think critically about how colonial legal systems shaped what is considered "customary law."
 - Develop **one open-ended question** that challenges dominant narratives about **colonialism**, **law**, **and power**.
 - Your question should be **complex**—it should **invite discussion rather than have a simple answer.**

Example of a Strong Question:

"If colonial rule institutionalized 'customary law' to serve its own legal framework, can postcolonial states ever fully reclaim pre-colonial legal traditions? Or are these systems permanently altered by the legacy of colonial power?"

2. Brief Reflection on the 'Marco Temporal' Debate

• After crafting your question, write a short response (250-350 words, about one page) explaining how the Marco Temporal case in Brazil connects to the broader themes of colonial legal legacies and the control of historical narratives.

- You do not need a full essay—just a concise, thoughtful reflection.
- Consider:
 - o How does the legal reasoning behind Marco Temporal reflect colonial-era legal justifications for controlling land?
 - o Do you see similarities between how "customary law" was shaped under colonial rule and the way Marco Temporal defines Indigenous land rights today?
 - o What does this case tell us about who has the power to define legal rights and history?

Step 2: Write a 250-350 word reflection connecting your question to the Marco Temporal case.
