# Golfer vs. Stewardship Delegation: Empowerment and Responsibility

The concepts of "failing forward" and "sometimes you win, sometimes you learn" reinforce the idea that setbacks are part of the journey toward success.

## **Dealing with Discouragement: Moving Beyond Failure**

Facing failure can be discouraging, but it's crucial not to let it define us. While disappointment is natural, true leaders find the strength to rise above it. Dealing with discouragement requires resilience, a growth mindset, and the ability to tap into our support networks. Remember, failure doesn't determine your worth as a leader; your response to failure does. This is especially true for ethical leaders who have faith, hope, and love. As leaders who rely on God, we have access to faith and to his armor. In the words of St. Augustine "[h]e who has God has everything, he who has everything but God has nothing."

## The Essence of Success: Hard Work, Prayer, and Suffering

True Leadership ends with an analysis of success based on St. Maximilian Kolbe's insight that "significant accomplishments are based on three pillars: hard work, prayer, and suffering" which holds profound wisdom.

- 1. **Hard Work:** Success rarely comes without diligence and effort. Leaders who invest time and energy into their goals lay the foundation for meaningful achievements.
- 2. **Prayer:** Spiritual connection and guidance play a vital role in leadership success. Prayer fosters inner strength, clarity, and a sense of purpose that guides ethical decision-making.
- 3. **Suffering:** Suffering might seem counterintuitive to success, but it shapes our character and resilience. It's through challenges that we learn, grow, and appreciate the journey.
