- Use examples, case studies to support your points.
- Reflect on how your understanding of this topic evolved during the course.
- If you encountered challenges understanding certain concepts, feel free to discuss them here—this paper welcomes honesty and openness.

3. Connection to Future Learning

- How might this topic shape your future academic or professional interests?
- Can you see yourself pursuing related questions or applying this perspective elsewhere?

4. Personal Reflection

- Reflect on your growth throughout the course.
- How has studying this topic deepened your understanding of law, justice, or culture?

Integration of Materials

- Use course readings and discussions to support your analysis.
- You may also include relevant external sources to expand your understanding, if appropriate.
- If there are parts of the course you found particularly difficult, confusing, or thought-provoking, feel free to reflect on those—this is a space to process as much as to present.

Evaluation Criteria

Your paper will be evaluated based on:

- **Clarity and coherence** in writing
- **Depth and originality** in your reflection and analysis
- **Effective integration** of course concepts and materials
- **Insightful connections** between your chosen topic, the course, and your personal learning journey

Formatting & Submission

- **Length:** There is no strict length requirement, but your paper should typically be between **1.5 to 4 pages** (double-spaced, 12pt font, standard margins).
