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Evidenced (12 points)

Your papers should use at least four first-person accounts of the past from the Envisioning World Civilization reader. These materials are the raw stuff of your essay and you will need to use them to make your argument. You should also use your text and the lectures to support your argument. (You do not need additional sources and are discouraged, but not prohibited, from using additional sources. If you use outside sources, they must be fully cited in such a way that we can easily locate the source of the material you are using. These outside sources may include online sources including Wikipedia, but please be aware that if generic online sources and encyclopedias are your only sources, you will receive zero points for this section.)

Contextual (10 points)

Your study must relate to the broader history of world civilizations after 1500. To do so, you will need to use the lectures and the textbook to describe the historical period and how that period relates to essay you are writing. Providing a broad context that takes into account what you have learned in the class is an essential part of writing history.

Analytical/Logical (15 points)

Historians don't just describe the past, they make arguments about why things happened and how things changed over time. How well you use the materials you have (evidence and context) to make an argument is the most important part of any paper.

Professionalism (3 points)

Given that you are new to academia, you will be given a little leeway in how you format your citations and bibliography; however, all references in the text must be cited. The essay should also be proofread and generally free of errors. You may include illustrations, but you should not count illustrations or long quotes when tallying the number of pages. [Plagiarism will lead to a failing grade for the paper.]



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
