
Relational Statements

The application of Watson’s Caring Theory through strategies that supported interconnectedness were implemented during the study. Some of the interventions used to support a caring and relaxing atmosphere were:

- Relaxing soft music
- Scented candles
- Deep breathing exercises
- Back massage
- Progressive muscle exercises
- Dim lighting

These transpersonal caring-healing modalities incorporated all the senses to promote holistic care of the mind, body and spirit (Arslan-Özkan, Okumuş, & Buldukoğlu, 2014).

Summary

Nursing care that is based on Watson's Caring Theory does increase self-efficacy, decrease distress and increase adjustment during infertility treatment. The caring and compassionate interventions decreased the negative impact of infertility and promoted improved results (Arslan-Özkan, Okumuş, & Buldukoğlu, 2014). It is suggested that more research be done in this area and that nurses involved with infertility be educated with this caring theory in mind. The concept of caring is central to the nursing discipline and facilitates holistic healthcare (Sitzman, 2007). Watson's Caring Theory can be applied to most nursing care settings and is a pragmatic approach to positive patient outcomes.
